





The PUMPKINS are HERE!!!!

We do a lot of good things at St. Luke's. We prepare and hand out food bags to friends in need. We offer Centering prayer and Lectio Divina and Koinonia Bible Study every week. We gather to study and serve. We welcome the community to our Labyrinth Prayer garden and share ministry with friends in recovery hosting five twelve step groups. We worship each Sunday and every third Friday. But, few things identify St. Luke's to the Shreveport/Bossier community better than our identity as the "Pumpkin Patch" church.

At first glance, one might think that has little to do with living and sharing the gospel or loving God and neighbor as self. But, don't be deceived. As Rafiki says to Simba in The Lion King "Look harder." Beneath what may appear to be a fun time in the fall filled with pumpkins and hay rides is a story that celebrates who we are as Christ followers.

Did you know that the pumpkins we sell at St. Luke's UMC are grown on a Navaho reservation in New Mexico that provides seasonal employment for Native Americans from four tribes? For many of the seasonal workers, the harvest labor makes a significant difference in their quality of life.

And did you know that the proceeds of the St. Luke's Pumpkin Patch do not come back into St. Luke's, but are used to support non-profit missions and ministry in the Shreveport-Bossier community? Through the work of the Patch, we have been able to provide help for families with troubled teens, work to get housing for the homeless, support people in recovery through twelve step work, offer a lifeline to young women seeking a way out of the sex-trafficking industry and provide protection for victims of abuse, to name just a few. The programs who receive donations from the St. Luke's Pumpkin Patch are organized and structured to work in specific areas that do far more than we could do to address these needs if we were working alone.

We are proud to be the oldest running Pumpkin Patch in the state of Louisiana. Even more, we are proud to be in partnership with friends beyond our walls as together we seek to be the hands and feet of Christ, sharing hope

Join us this month as we celebrate Life in the Patch that brings joy to those who volunteer and hope to those who receive support for their ministry.

Just Showing Up..... Rev. Betsy Eaves

On Friday, September 22 I had some relatively minor foot surgery that required my missing church on September 24. That Sunday morning I wrote the following post on Facebook while most of my St. Luke's family gathered together for worship. I share it with you again here:

This weekend I chose to take the route of extra self-care. Not knowing how my pain would be after a little foot surgery Friday and hearing the doctor's recommendation to elevate my foot for at least 48 hours I worked with Mama T and Hannah to plan for worship at St. Luke's sans Betsy - video sermon and lots of help from others. I probably could have pushed. I don't know. But, for once I didn't. And while I sit in the quiet of a Sunday morning at home I am pondering. I am reminded of the value of community. St. Luke's has become my family and I miss my faith family this morning. I miss the smiles, the laughter, the hugs, the conversations, the excitement about Pumpkin Patch. Like family, we don't always agree. We sometimes see life and faith and theology and politics and priorities differently. But, we have made a commitment to live and love in a community that puts loving God and neighbor as self at the top of the list. I cherish the opportunity to be in a faith community that puts love first, that believes in listening to one another and honoring and trusting one another. During Story Time at the Pumpkin Patch, Ann O'Brien Willis makes a point of teaching the children about all the different kinds of pumpkins and how each one is beautiful in its own unique way. During this time in our world when it is so easy to be harsh and critical of people who are different or who think, look or vote differently, I give thanks for a community that is my faith family....and for all who are willing to walk the road together while we figure it out in the midst of our diverse ways of seeing the world. I think of all the people who have given up on living life in a faith community because of disagreements or differences and I grieve the loss. We need each other and the world is a better place when we figure out how to love, honor and respect each other. In a small way I think we do that each time we gather ...on a Sunday morning or in a Bible study or at the third Friday Low Key service or to work with each other in the Patch. Just showing up together says "I'm here and I'm here to walk alongside you. Together we will find our way." That's a start. Just showing up. A quiet Sunday morning while I heal is nice in its way. But, next week I'll show up to hang out with my family...because I'm better when I do. I hope to see some of you there, too. And if not at St. Luke's with us, I hope you will gather sometime this week with people who welcome each other in the midst of diversity and put love first.

Music Ministry Hannah Rachal

If you were here for Stewardship Sunday you heard me discuss my loves for music and neuroscience. We know that music is good for our hearts, souls, and enhances our worship experience...but what does it do for and to our brains? Music lowers cortisol, increases immunoglobulin A, and increases dopamine. Musician's brains are more likely to be better at combining and using auditory and visual cues. This leads to larger corpus callosums and better functional brain connectivity... more practically stated, music decreases stress, helps immunity, causes pleasure receptors to be activated, and aids motor skills and movement.

I realize at this point you may be thinking "Okay, Hannah, this is great trivia and all but what does this mean for St. Luke's?" Well, my answer to you is: Couldn't we all profit from these positive attributes of music? What if we were to harness all the great benefits? My guess is that we'd be a happier, healthier congregation. For this reason, I am going to be offering lessons in learning to read music beginning in November. All are welcome! It will begin with the very basic information and build on that. There will be two times I'll be leading these lessons: Sunday mornings (during Sunday school hour, 9:30am) and Wednesday evenings (time TBD). Each week the material will be similar, if not the same, but Sunday morning will serve more to connect to sacred music and the importance of hymnody and Wednesday evenings will be geared more toward practical application in music performance. I hope you'll join me!
